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Are you a mentor?

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Homer's *Odyssey* is where we find the origin of our word “mentor”. In this epic work, Odysseus appoints Mentor to educate his son, Telemachus. The definition of the term, mentor, is the work Mentor does in Homer's work. Being a mentor is therefore one who is a wise counselor, teacher or educator of another.

While the word “mentor” is not found in the New Testament, the concept is prevalent in the life of every Christian.

First, we should be able to teach others. Paul writes to Timothy, “And the things which thou has heard from me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also” (2 Timothy 2:2). The term “men” is the Greek word, “anthropos”, a general term for “mankind”. Therefore, both male and females should be able to teach others. While women have limitations in not teaching over a man (1 Timothy 2:12), they should be able to teach (Titus 2:3-5). Men and women faithful to the revealed word of Christ should prepare themselves to be mentors in the sense of being teachers.

Second, a teacher must set the proper example before those he or she teaches. Paul writes, “The things which ye both learned and received and heard and saw in me, these things do: and the God of peace shall be with you” (Philippians 4:9). Paul offered something for others to see as well as hear. He was not only teaching with words, but he was providing a proper example to follow. Paul exhorts brethren, “...be ye imitators together of me, and mark them that so walk even as ye have us for an example” (Philippians 3:17, 1 Cor. 11:1).

The Christian provides an example of diligence and total commitment to the teachings of God. Paul exhorts Timothy to be this type of example: “Be diligent in these things; give thyself wholly to them; that thy progress may be manifest unto all (1 Timothy 4:15). The Christian takes heed to how he lives as well as what he teaches (1 Timothy 4:16).

Why does our society want mentors? They want people worthy of respect. They need people who are setting forth the proper example. Is this not what every Christian is to provide for mem-

bers of society around him or her?

Third, the Christian invests time and energy in encouraging others to walk in the way of the Lord. Paul invested much of himself in the lives of the Thessalonians. “As you know how we dealt with each one of you, as a father with his own children, exhorting you, and encouraging you and testifying, to the end that ye should walk worthily of God, who calleth you into his own kingdom and glory” (1 Thessalonians 2:12). Each individual person was important to Paul. With the love of a father he came to the side of each one exhorting and encouraging each person. Is this not what we want from a mentor: personal exhortation and encouragement along with teaching?

Dear Christian, prepare yourself to teach the gospel to others. Give yourself totally to God and the Gospel with diligence. You will then be a proper example to imitate. Invest your time in exhorting and encouraging someone who needs a little boost in the way of righteousness. In taking the time to be a Christian, you will be a mentor.
