I. ISRAEL WITH SO MUCH PROMISE WITH GOD HAS FALLEN TO THE DEPTHS WITH IDOLATRY (Chapters 9-11)

- A. Israel rejoicing over their material prosperity will end with eating the bread of mourning in Assyria (9:1-9).
- B. Ephraim found by God like a fresh cluster of grapes has corrupted herself through idolatry unto death (9:10-17).
- C. Israel once a promising fruitful vine has now become a poisonous herb through calf worship and destined for destruction (10:1-8).
- D. Israel's history of persistency in sin has taken them too far to save (10:9-15).
- E. Ephraim like a little child was guided by a loving God and taught how to walk only to return such love with ingratitude by following dumb idols which will end with bondage in Assyria (11:1-11).
 - 1. God calls his children out of Egypt showing them love (v. 1-4).
 - 2. The "Egypt" of their bondage will be Assyria (v. 5-7).
 - 3. God's love will not give up Israel to utter destruction (v. 8-11).
