JEREMIAH – LESSON TWO

INTRODUCTION:

Chapters 2-6 seem to point to some of Jeremiah's early prophetic work during Josiah's reign (cf. 3:6). While outward forms of reform may have been seen (2 Kings 22-23, 2 Chron. 34,35), the inward heart of the people needed to be changed (3:10, 4:4). In this section of prophecies, God's people is brought to God's courtroom and indicted of their sins (chapters 2), pleaded with to repent (chapter 3) and forced to see the inescapable judgment via their enemy "from the north" (chapters 4-6).
